A BRIEF HISTORY OF DILLARD UNIVERSITY

ating back to 1869, Dillard University was born from the union of two institutions that served as equity-building engines in the South. Those two institutions, New Orleans University and Straight University, met the demand to provide higher education for the influx of formerly enslaved people into New Orleans following the Civil War. Straight University was founded in 1869 with support from the American Missionary Association of the Congregational Church (now the United Church of Christ). Although New Orleans University was founded in 1873, its roots go back to Thompson Biblical Institute—founded in 1866—which later became a biblical department within Union Normal School in 1869, which was run by the Freedmen's Aid Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church (now the United Methodist Church), established to train African American teachers, providing a significant need throughout the South.

Straight quickly drew the attention of students from other parts of the southern United States, particularly because of their law and medical schools. The university withstood a wealth of adversity, including the main campus building being set ablaze and relocation, before becoming Straight College in 1905. However, so august was Straight's academic programming that it produced such luminaries as: P.B.S. Pinchback, the first African American governor of Louisiana; social justice activists, Louis A. Martinet, Rodolphe L. Desdunes and Alice Dunbar Nelson; educators Fannie C. Williams and Valena C. Jones; and physician James W. Ames who founded the first hospital for African Americans in Detroit. New Orleans University was part of an ecosystem of institutions designed to educate and support African Americans. A significant part of that ecosystem was Flint Medical College, founded in 1889 to meet the demand for trained African American nurses. Later, New Orleans University absorbed Phyllis Wheatley Sanitarium. The sanitarium was renamed Sara Goodridge Nurse Training School which later joined Flint Medical College to become Flint-Goodridge Hospital in 1916.

Among other institutions that were part of this network was Gilbert Academy which was later incorporated into New Orleans University in 1919. Among New Orleans University's notable alumni was Rev. John W.E. Bowen Sr., one of the first African Americans in the U.S. to earn a Ph.D. A combination of the rise of Jim Crow and World War I proved to be significant challenges for New Orleans University and Straight College, however. The boards of New Orleans University and Straight College agreed to continue the work of creating more African Americans leaders by consolidating. On June 6, 1930, the newly formed board of trustees proposed a charter for a new institution. The new University would be named for James Hardy Dillard, an educational reformer who promoted racial harmony. Opening its doors in 1935, Dillard began to write its legacy with impressive leadership and faculty. Will W. Alexander served as the University's first acting president (1935–1936). Under his leadership, noted scholars filled the classrooms. Among them was S. Randolph Edmonds, regarded by many as the "dean of Black academic theater" and whose work led to the establishment of the first degree-granting theater program at an HBCU.

In 1936, William Stuart Nelson was appointed president, and his leadership laid the foundation for a tradition at Dillard that extends to the present day. He was instrumental in the implementation of a major arts festival which created a venue for local artists and national figures to enjoy and debate the nature of African American art, past, present and future. Nelson also worked with music instructor Frederick Douglass Hall to write the University's alma mater, "Fair Dillard." In 1941, Albert W. Dent was named Dillard's second president and his legendary tenure lasted until 1969. Having served as the superintendent of Flint-Goodridge Hospital, Dent guided Dillard through turbulent decades. Still, he made remarkable strides.

Having declared that "a nursing program in Dillard University should develop better persons as well as better nurses," the University became the first institution of higher learning in Louisiana to establish an accredited baccalaureate program in nursing. Dent was also responsible for Dillard becoming a founding member of the United Negro College Fund in 1944. Under Dent, Dillard's national and international profile as a liberal arts institution grew. Dillard also came to play a role as one of New Orleans' critical civic anchors. Behind the scenes, Dent played a part in negotiating race relations throughout the city. He worked with Mayor deLesseps S. Morrison on desegregating New Orleans' public services while promoting University events that spoke to Black identity and pride. Most notable of those events was Dillard's 1968 Festival of Afro-American Arts.

Dr. Broadus N. Butler's appointment in 1969 as Dillard's third president marked, for the University, a renewed commitment to the liberal arts. Butler's most important contribution is considered to be the implementation of the Scholars-Statesman Lecture Series which was housed in the Division of Social Sciences. The series was designed to "bring to the presence of Dillard University students and the New Orleans community a series of men and women who have made distinctive achievements in their own lives and who are themselves living models of the kind of excellence to which our students aspire and which our community should always respect." The lecture series brought to campus key figures such as Benjamin Elijah Mays, Etta Moten Barnett, Aaron Douglas and Arna Bontemps. However, with the board of trustees' desire to transform the University's curriculum to meet the changing student body, Butler made the decision to resign in November 1973.

In 1974, Dillard would see another leader begin a legendary tenure. Dr. Samuel DuBois Cook became the University's fourth president, strengthening and expanding the curriculum, increasing the percentage of faculty members holding doctoral degrees, raising the requirements for admission and eventually increasing student enrollment by 50 percent. During that time, in 1979, Dillard became the first university in Louisiana to offer a bachelor's degree in public health. Cook's leadership also led to an expansion of student services and an increase in fundraising to improve the campus and facilities. In 1989, he created the Dillard University National Conference on Black-Jewish Relations from which sprang the Dillard University National Center for Black-Jewish Relations. With a desire to expand students' global view, the University added a Japanese studies program in 1990, the first of its kind at an HBCU. Most notably, Dillard's endowment grew from \$5 million to more than \$40 million under Cook's leadership. Following Cook's historic run, Dr. Michael L. Lomax became Dillard University's fifth president. A noted scholar, administrator, political leader and entrepreneur, Lomax undertook the challenge to transform the University into one of the finest liberal arts colleges in the nation. He led a \$60 million campus renovation program to focus on students' living and learning environments. Enrollment increased 49 percent, reaching more than 2,200 students from the U.S., the Caribbean and Africa. Having also tripled alumni, individual, corporate and foundation giving, Lomax helped Dillard reach a U.S. News & World Report ranking of 20th in the top tier of colleges and universities in the South by 2002. In 2004, Lomax decided that it was time to move on to a new assignment, accepting the position of CEO and president of UNCF.

On July I, 2005, Dr. Marvalene Hughes began her tenure as the sixth and first woman to serve as president of Dillard University. Barely allowed to settle in at Dillard, Hughes was faced with the threat of Hurricane Katrina just over a month after beginning her tenure. Amid the well-documented destruction that Katrina caused, Hughes facilitated, with unwavering determination, the rebuilding of Dillard's historic, 55-acre campus. In the first year of Hughes' tenure, and again in 2006, the University raised more than \$34 million in public and private gifts and grants, far exceeding any previous annual total in Dillard's history.



In 2008, Dillard launched its first capital campaign, Advantage Dillard!, with a goal of raising \$70 million for six priority areas: increasing student scholarships; enhancing teaching, learning, and campus facilities; introducing cutting-edge technology; enhancing the library; strengthening general program support; and securing Dillard's future through general endowment.

Following the Class of 2010's commencement exercises, Hughes cut the ribbons for two exciting new facilities, the Professional Schools and Sciences Building and the Student Union and Health and Wellness Center. With tremendous service having been rendered to Dillard University, Hughes transitioned from the presidency in 2011.

On July 1, 2012, Dr. Walter Kimbrough became Dillard's seventh president. Having earned the moniker "The Hip Hop Prez" during his tenure as the president of Philander Smith College, Kimbrough's dynamic presence played a role in raising the profile of Dillard as it continued to recover from Hurricane Katrina. One of his most significant accomplishments was having a \$160 million Hurricane Katrina loan from the federal government forgiven in 2018. That paved the way for the University's endowment to grow from \$48 million to \$105 million. Also impressive was the alumni giving rate reaching 23 percent. Academically, Kimbrough turned his attention to several programs. In 2012, the University introduced its film studies program, a response to the number of "Hollywood South" film and television productions in Louisiana. By 2018, Dillard's physics program had become known for being a top producer of African American physics graduates. The University also began to experience success in its pre-law program. In 2021, 93 percent of the pre-law students who applied for law schools had been accepted. Kimbrough's work also left a significant fundraising mark on Dillard. The University received its largest single alumni gift—\$1 million from Jimmie Edwards. Dillard also received its single largest private gift when philanthropist MacKenzie Scott donated \$5 million in 2020. A year later, alumnus and board of trustees chair, Michael D. Jones facilitated a \$5 million gift to the newly established Center for Racial Justice with the help of the law firm Kirkland and Ellis. Even further leveraging the power and influence of social media, Dillard utilized GivingTuesday as a fundraising opportunity, going from more than \$64,000 in gifts in 2016 to more than \$1.3 million in 2021. Feeling that his work at Dillard had been done, Kimbrough announced in August of 2021 that he would hand off the "leadership baton."

Dr. Rochelle L. Ford, the highly energetic dean of Elon University's School of Communications, became Dillard's eighth president on July I, 2022. Upon her arrival, Ford immediately got to work under the theme "Activating our Commitment." Driven by the University's mission to "cultivate leaders who live ethically, think and communicate precisely, and act courageously to make the world a better place," Dr. Ford identified three key areas, dubbed the DU3, that will solidify Dillard's status as not only the HBCU of choice, but more specifically, the University of Choice in Louisiana. They are: Facilities that Withstand the Forecast, Faculty and Staff Fortification, and Financing the Future.

Within her first two weeks of office, Dr. Ford launched an online feedback forum where faculty and staff openly shared their visions, concerns, and support for the University. The suggestions, memories, and stories, continue to inspire her to carry out Dillard's mission. A true visionary and president who leads by example, Dr. Ford set a personal goal of completing IOO major accomplishments within her first IOO days in office. Not only did she meet that goal, she surpassed it ahead of her self-imposed deadline. She works diligently with the Board of Trustees, faculty, staff, students, alums and community leaders to gather information and direction that will empower her with tools and strategies needed to prioritize the next steps that will propel the University to an unparalleled level of distinction.

COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER & HONORARY DEGREE RECIPIENT



Davis is president of Disney Branded Television, the unit of Disney Entertainment Television that creates premium original content for kids and families for Disney+, Disney Junior and Disney Channel. In this role, Davis leads development, current, production, casting and business affairs for the group's expansive slate of live-action, unscripted and animated entertainment.

Since being named to this role in 2021, Davis has led one of the industry's most successful and award-winning slates for kids, from preschool hits like "Bluey," the most-watched series for Kids 2-II in 2023, "Marvel's Spidey and his Amazing Friends," and "Superkitties," 2023's No. I most-watched new series for Kids 2-5 – to popular programs for Kids 9-I4, like "Kiff," "Raven's Home," and the ever-popular "ZOMBIES" and "Descendants" franchises. As a result, Disney Branded Television content helped keep Disney Junior the #I preschool network for the IIth straight year in 2023, and Disney Channel the #I cable network for Girls 6-II for 18 consecutive years.

Davis' team is also behind some of Disney+'s most successful original series, movies and specials, from global sensation "Percy Jackson and the Olympians," which was one of the top streaming premieres of 2023, to hit series "Goosebumps," and major musical events like the Emmy® Award-winning "Elton John Live: Farewell from Dodger Stadium."

Under Davis' leadership, Disney Branded Television earned an industry-leading 74 nominations and 14 wins at the 2023 Children's and Family Emmys Awards; eight nominations and three wins for the 75th Primetime Emmy Awards; a 2024 Academy Award® nomination for Sean Wang's documentary short "Ni Nai & Wài Pó;" a 2023 Academy Award nomination for Alfonso Cuarón's live-action short "Le Pupille," and numerous others.

Davis has attracted some of the industry's top creative talent to overalls with Disney Branded Television, including Tim Federle ("High School Musical: The Musical: The Series"), Bruce W. Smith and Ralph Farquhar ("The Proud Family: Louder and Prouder"), Chris and Shane Houghton ("Big City Greens") and Dan Povenmire ("Phineas and Ferb," "Hamster & Gretel").

A 20+-year veteran of The Walt Disney Company, Davis' prior roles included EVP, Creative Development and Strategy at Disney Branded Television from 2020-2021; and before that, she was EVP, Talent and Casting at ABC Entertainment and Disney+. There, she played an integral role in acclaimed series including "Desperate Housewives" and "black-ish," and championed the careers of notable actors such as Viola Davis, Eva Longoria, and Lupita Nyong'o.



HONORARY DEGREE RECIPIENT



arren A. Bell Jr. is a New Orleans native with a long-established presence in broadcast media as a TV & Radio news anchor, news manager and talk show host, in addition to producing numerous documentaries on critical topics over those years. Bell anchored his first radio news broadcast in 1968 at WYLD-AM while still attending St. Augustine High School. By 1977 the Yale University graduate ('73, Afro American Studies) had returned home making local broadcasting history as New Orleans' firstBlack weekday prime-time TV News anchor at WDSU-TV (1974-1980) plus stints at WGNO-TV as Public Affair Director, Host of WYES-TV "Informed Sources" and Senior News anchor (1987-94) at WVUE-TV. During subsequent career stops at WYLD Radio where his career began, Bell established its award-winning News & Public Affairs tradition.Mr. Bell also served in multiple Higher Education and media consulting roles. Serving first in the classroom as an adjunct instructor

(1983-2000) then as Director of Dillard University's Mass Communication Division. Next as an Associate V.P. for University & Media Relations (2003-2011) at Xavier University of Louisiana. His lastHBCU assignment came as Founding Director of the Honoré Center for Undergraduate Student Achievement (2012-2017) a program established by Southern University to recruit young men from underserved NOLA communities for support to develop them of New Orleans. In August 2023 he received the New Orleans Association of Black Journalists LEGACY Award. Bell has received numerous other local and regional awards for service as well as his journalistic efforts over a 50-year career. He just released a TV documentary for 2024. Buried History: Finding Our Past tells his personal story of learning more about his own family history while taking over a neglected family tomb -- but more importantly, to showcase an even richer neglected history of the achievements of Free Blacks in New Orleans dating back before the Civil War.


Bell is married, a proud father of four daughters, and a doting "Papa Bell" to five grandchildren.

dgar F. Poree Jr. earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in education from Xavier University of Louisiana in 1958. He was also a Fellow of Tulane University's Issues Forum, Loyola University's Institute of Politics, and Louisiana State University's Executive Program.

While working as a sixth grade teacher in the New Orleans Public School System, Mr. Poree submitted a Comprehensive strategic revenue proposal to the school district, which was adopted as the district's Strategic One-Cent Sales Tax Campaign Plan. In the summer of 1966, Poree was appointed Director of Total Community Action's Neighborhood Youth Corp and Anti-Poverty Initiative. The US Department of Labor adopted his youth development handbook as the Southwest Region's official handbook. In the fall of 1971, Poree was appointed Staff Manager of Operator Services for South Central Bell Telephone Company. In that role, he was responsible for a thirty-member management team, and 260 Operators.

In 1986, Poree was promoted to District Manager of Corporate and Community Affairs of BellSouth Telecommunications, and served as Chief Spokesperson for BellSouth in Metro-New Orleans. Since his retirement in 2001, Mr. Poree has remained activing in business, educational, civic and Community affairs, serving on numerous boards and committees including: Tulane University's A.B. Freeman Business Council, UNO Business Council, SUNO Foundation, Downtown Development District,

Advisory Board of Louisiana Colleges, Dryades Street

Advisory Board of Louisiana Colleges, Dryades Street YMCA, Downtown Rotary, Salvation Army, New Orleans Symphony Orchestra, and Bethany United Methodist Church Administrative Board.

Mr. Poree has received numerous awards and recognitions for outstanding community service, and has served as guest lecturer, motivational, and commencement speaker for business, religious, educational, social and community events throughout the state.

Edgar F. Poree, Jr. was married to the late Gloria Guichard, is the father of Deidra Poree Pierre and Edgar, III. He is the grandfather of Troy Pierre, II and Alexis Pierre, and is father-in-law of Tyra Mitchell Poree.

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ACADEMIC HERALDRY

The history of traditional academic dress is traced to the 12th century when Oxford University was founded and to the medieval European universities of the 14th century. Although European universities follow varied patterns in cut and color of gown and type of head dress, academic dress at American colleges and universities is fairly standardized.

The traditional academic gown is usually black. The pattern varies with the degrees held. The bachelor's gown has a simple design, with long, pointed sleeves as its distinguishing mark. The master's gown has oblong sleeves with the rear cut square and the front featuring a cutaway arc.

The most elaborate academic costume is the doctoral gown, with velvet panels down the front and three velvet bars across the sleeves. The velvet is usually black, but it may be a color designating the subject to which the degree pertains.

The hood of the doctoral gown features velvet trimmings, the width of which designates the level of the degree. The color of the hood indicates the major field of study, and its lining identifies the institution that granted the degree. Dillard's doctoral gown is navy blue with front panels and four cobalt blue chevrons trimmed in metallic gold.
